PRIVATE POLICE STARTED HERE

Anderson Opposes Move Of Residents In Hiring Special Officers For Home Districts

Although opposed by Chief of Police James Anderson and considered a reflection on Birmingham's police department, village officials Monday night were unable to devise means to discourage residents of the Quanton Lake Estates district from hiring private police to patrol their properties at night. According to Manager James W. Parry, residents in this district are dissatisfied with the village police protection, claiming that not enough trips are made nightly about their property.

Chief Anderson picked up one of the private policemen last week and sent him out of town. It was reported. Village Attorney Clare H. Ogden told the commission that there was no legal way to prevent residents of the community from hiring private protection.
