A NEW PROHIBITION SLANT
In discussing the effect of prohibition upon the United States, economically, politically and morally, last week with a prominent railroad official, one whose business engagements bring him in and out of the United States and places him in contact with all classes of society and business, he said, in answer to my question as to his opinion of the effect of prohibition upon the people of the United States, so far as it has gone, "Prohibition so far as I can see its effect, is economically of immense benefit to the United States. There is no question in my mind, judging from my observations, but that

affairs have more and more become vitally interwoven with the affairs of the outside world, delays and injuries have become more and more genuinely serious. The banks in Detroit are to be congratulated upon finally taking a step they have been considering for some time, and which furthers public convenience and interest in a rather important way. BAN ON BILLBOARDS

From many sections of the country come further reports of official action against the billboard nuisance, which has done more to destroy the natural beauty of the countryside than any other agency devised by man. A vigorous campaign against billboards is being waged by several national organizations, the women's clubs being particularly active in the movement. They are in many instances appealing to the advertisers direct, showing them that a billboard which defaces the scenery makes ill-willed friends for the firm resorting to this form of publicity. In Georgia the highway board recently adopted a resolution providing that all advertising signs be prohibited on the rights of way, and that in every practicable way the beautification of the highways be encouraged by the planting of trees and the clearing away of all objectionable and unsightly objects.—Exchange.

Tuesday, for the first time in the history of Detroit, the banks of the city opened and transacted business while a primary election was in progress. They took that action after receiving careful legal advice which convinced them that they could unlock their doors without disregarding the law which makes an election day a legal holiday, primary day being a day set apart merely for the purpose of selecting nominees (formerly chosen in conventions), and not a day upon which public officials are actually chosen.
