"Meter Boy," belonging to E. P. Hammond, scheduled to take part in this race, was not offered due to his condition due to a mishap in shipping. Miss Viola Hammond took fourth place with "Bud Ammer" in the Helen Niblack trophy race. "Bud Ammer" also was said not to have been in condition.

E. S. Nichols' "Black Rock" lost first place by a nose in a thrilling Master's trophy race to "Bogie Man" owned by J. B. Baldwin. "Black Rock" was ridden by the owner.

One of the big disappointments of the race was the accident to Billy Klair, owned by Walter Briggs. The horse took a short turn and fell to the ground with a broken leg. He had to be shot. A. G. Wilson was up "Billy Klair" in the Open Sweepstakes Chase at the Bloomfield Hunt races last year and was quite a young horse of much promise.
