TWINS SPLIT ON FIRST ELECTION



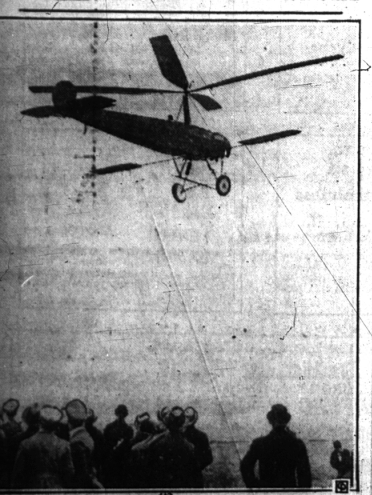

KIDNAPERS RELEASE CHICAGO BOY



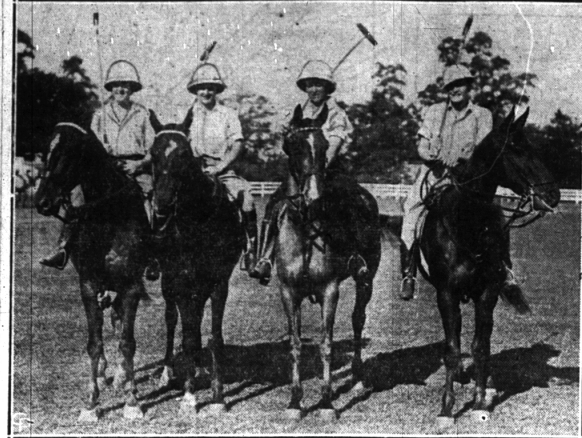

GYRO PLANE FLIES OVER CHANNEL



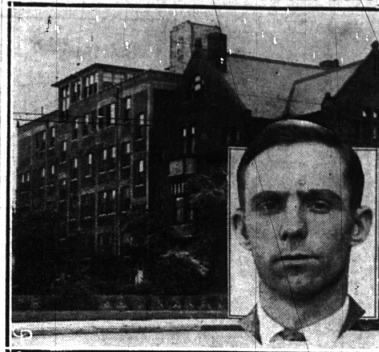

CONTINUES ATTACK ON GOV. SMITH



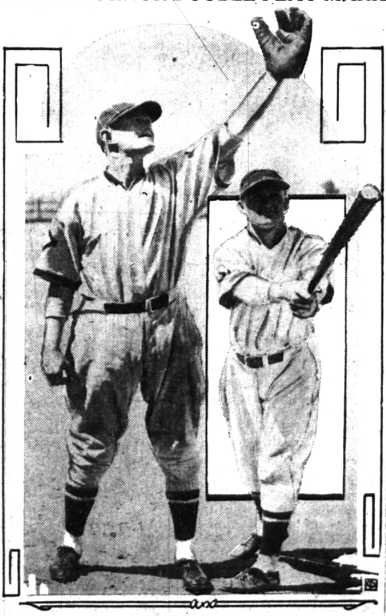
