

# Four Motorists Injured in Troy Accidents

## CROSSING STOP STREET LANDS DRIVER IN JAIL

### Birmingham Man Escapes Injuries When Car Is Demolished

#### NAB TRAFFIC 'CUTTER'

Four persons are covering today from injuries sustained in accidents in Troy township.

When the car driven by Mrs. Pike, 272 Palmer avenue, crossed the street, it was struck by a car driven by Harold Morry, 1478 John R. street, Detroit. Morry's machine was hit by a car driven by John B. and Auburn roads. Martin Kline, Romeo, who drove the truck owned by the Romeo Milling company failed to halt at a stop sign and was arrested on charges of reckless driving. He paid a fine of \$100 to William S. Walker, justice of the peace. The injured were rushed to St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac, in the ambulance of T. E. Nicholson of Rochester.

While attempting to make a left hand turn from Main street at 6 p. m., Sunday, the coach driven by Fed Lendzian, Route 4, Birmingham, was badly wrecked. William Stewart, Route 2, Rochester, who was also southbound on Main street was struck by Lendzian. Both drivers escaped injury although Stewart's car overturned on the street car tracks.

Lendzian, who was making a

left hand turn, claimed he held out his hand. Stewart told the police who investigated that he saw no indication of the turn, blaming the other driver.

William Tallishah of Detroit paid \$30 fine and costs to Justice Walker after pleading guilty to charges of reckless driving made by Deputy Sheriff George Forsythe. The deputy said that the man was cutting the traffic on the John R. road and forcing several cars off the road, Sunday.

## TROY TO VOTE ON PROTECTION

### Fire Equipment Problem Goes To Electorate In Township

The problem of fire protection will be put to a vote of the residents of Troy Township, it has been decided by the township board. The question will arise in the April election.

The resolution which was adopted decided that the matter of purchasing fire equipment for the township be postponed until such time as the matter could be properly balloted and approved by the voters at large.

This decision acts as the deciding factor in the question of providing local fire protection in Troy this fall following the expiration of a contract with the Birmingham fire department and the refusal of a new contract proffered from the village manager.

## DEATH CRASH FAULTY PROP

### DRIVERS FREED BLAMED FOR FATAL CRASH

#### Jury Finds Double Carelessness In Fatal Accident

Failure of Oscar E. Brandt, Auburn Heights, and Marshall Nachtergaele, Milan, to drive with proper caution was given by a coroner's jury Saturday as the cause of the death of Leonard Brandt, 11 year old son of Brandt.

The boy was killed in an accident last week. Nachtergaele, who was arrested at the time of the accident but later released, admitted he failed to stop before turning onto Auburn avenue, saying he did not know it was a stop road. Nine other persons were injured in the accident. Six were riding with Nachtergaele. Neither driver was held.

Following an investigation, Deputy Sheriff Frank Greenan testified that both drivers had a clear view for a long distance on both roads. O. C. Farmer, county coroner, presided at the inquest.

## LAHSER ROAD OPENS OCT. 10

### New Pavement Parallels Southfield And Telegraph Highways

#### No Inquest Will Be Called In Death Of Two Airmen

#### DEPUTY INVESTIGATES

Opening the Lahser road's new pavement is announced today for Oct. 10, by Leon V. Balknap, Oakland County road engineer. Paralleling the Telegraph road, the new pavement will extend from the Eight Mile to the Long Lake road. This is a distance of about nine miles.

It is expected to relieve the heavy north and south bound traffic that the Southfield and Telegraph roads have been sharing. The pavement varies in width from 20 to 40 feet.

Two men are dead today as a result of the crash of an antiquated "Jenny" plane on the Plum Hollow golf course, near Royal Oak, Saturday noon. Engine trouble and possibly a faulty propeller are believed by Deputy Sheriff Schrader, who investigated, to be the reasons for the fall of the plane which caused the death of both of its occupants.

Charles H. Nixon, 19 years old, of 15405 Linwood avenue, Detroit, and Linwood Cardwell, 28 years old, living at the Palmer Aviation club, Eight Mile and Lahser roads, were the victims. Both men were dead when removed from the wrecked plane which fell between the fifteenth and sixteenth holes on the golf course. Nixon was thrown by the impact on top of Cardwell, who was strapped in the seat. The airplane was of the old army type known as the "jenny." License to these planes have been refused as the type is condemned as unsafe. Nixon had purchased the ship, which was rated as unsafe previously when its wing was broken in a crash, and was taking his final lessons in flying under Cardwell.

The propeller of the craft was found 1000 feet from the scene of the accident, by Deputy Schrader he said. His theory was that the plane was flying too low and grazed several trees at the western end of the golf course knocking the propeller off. It is believed that the propeller might have flown off and consequently the plane lost altitude, finally crashing.

No inquest will be held, it is announced by Coroner O. C. Farmer, following an investigation.
