POLICE SEEK 'GLOVED' THUG

Four House Burglaries Reported in Village During Week

Four house burglaries and the theft of \$226 from a gasoline station are being investigated today by Birmingham police.

R. C. Slape, 121 Cole avenue, atwell at an oil station at the Maple and Southfield roads, reported to police an unidentified man took \$226 in cash from the register in the station while he was at work outside the building.
