Works in Windsor and built up a thriving business there. However, in 1888 he sold out his interest and entered the publishing business, becoming a member of the Detroit Evening News.

Shortly before this, he married Ellen Warren Scripps, of Detroit, who in 1873 founded the Detroit News.

The story of Mr. Booth's rise in the publishing business is one of a man who followed one line of work independently of the other, bettering everything he met. The Grand Rapids Press, which was his first independent publishing venture, was formed from two bankrupt Grand Rapids papers which he bought in 1890, and is now a valuable property. The Book Publishing Company, which includes newspapers in Ann Arbor, Bay City, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Muskegon, Saginaw, Grand Rapids and Flint, was formed in partnership with his younger brother, Ralph H. Booth.

All this time Mr. Booth was amassing his fortune, though not submerging his appreciation of the cultural. In 1902 the "Cranbrook Press" published a small book, "The Pleasures of Painting," written by Mr. Booth. This book resembles a group of essays and is an intelligent treatment of the artistic feeling by a man who was also an artist.

A visitor in the architectural Art and Crafts building at Cranbrook would see behind this work a man who re-

garded art as of paramount importance in education. In fact, in Mr. Booth we find a man who is looking beyond this age to what he believes will be the greatest age of all time and to further this dream he has given his entire fortune to found the Cranbrook Schools.

Miss Margaret Bonfield, Mr. Booth's daughter, declared in a recent address that what the modern girl needs most is grace.

"In addition to a thorough general education we mean to stress the study of the arts and crafts here at Cranbrook. I believe that American youth should grow up appreciating beauty. Only then will we produce a race where wealth and power are secondary to culture and the true character will be formed," he said.

It is the craftsman's love of good and beautiful work applied to useful service that Mr. Booth admires so much. He believes that this is the keynote of success in any profession.

Since 1902 Mr. Booth has been president of the Evening News Association. His other business connections include: Booth Investment Company, of Detroit; vice-president of the George F. Scripps Corporation of Detroit; chairman of the board of Booth Publishing Company, of Detroit; vice-president of the Detroit Art Association; and director of the Society of the State of James E. Scripps.
