

DEATH TAKES MRS. BRAUN

Prominent Society Matron
Succumbs In
Illinois

Mrs. Victoria Braun, 79 years old, former society matron of prominence, died today. Her death is due to injuries sustained in a fall in McHenry, Ill., where she died.

Mrs. Braun was born in England and spent her girlhood there. Later she lived on a farm which Royal Oak now covers. The later years of her life were spent in fashionable homes in Bloomfield Hills where she was prominent in society.

She is the mother of Joseph A. Braun of Bloomfield Hills, president of the Braun Lumber company.

Burial was in St. Mary's cemetery, Royal Oak, yesterday following a requiem high mass in St.
