It is the plan of the association to give educational activities a part in each one of the programs and Mrs. F. Farrington Holt has been chosen chairman of the education board.

The pre-school committee will be headed by Mrs. Carleton Fox and under her guidance three projects will be studied: the small nursery, the play exhibit and the home school.

Mrs. William E. Essery will be chairman of the elementary school section and Mrs. Stowe D. Baldwin will lead the adolescent group. Under the management of each of these heads there will be a study group as last year.

The Parent Teachers association is planning to repeat the adolescent program put on by the A. A. U. W. last year in their work this fall.

In connection with the adolescent group Mr. Irwin Chester Johnson, head of the boy's work of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, will give a course of six lectures.

The association stresses the fact that these lectures are open to the public and that all mothers interested are invited to attend. Mrs. Fred Farrer, president stated.

The educational work will be managed by Mrs. Herbert G. Wood who is chairman of the scholarship fund.

A college information bureau has been formed with Mrs. Richard C. Fowler as chairman. The association plans to give two tests in January for high school girls and their mothers. At these tests, professions will be discussed and arrangements made that the girls may interview women who have followed various professions.
