1400 ASK BOARD TO SAVE TREES IN BIRMINGHAM

"Moral Support" Petition Is Presented By Arts Association

SEEK PLANNER HERE

A petition containing more than 1,400 names asking that the trees of Birmingham be saved, is on file at the village offices today following its presentation Monday night by a group of citizens under the auspices of the Community Arts Association of Oakland County.

The petition is designed to furnish moral support to the commission its stand against cutting down trees for street widenings. Miss Margaret Wittemore a member of the group said:

"So strong is the sentiment against this practice that we easily could have obtained 5,000 more names if we thought it would be more effective," she said.

Inquires Progress

In making the presentation and in stating the ideals and purpose of the association, Mr. Eric Cortis-Stanford gave the following talk:

"In order to secure beauty and efficiency in the village of Birmingham, a scientific and workable plan must be devised. Because of the absence of such a plan, the commission finds itself compelled to follow the wishes of 51 per cent of the property owners on any street, regardless of the benefit to the village at large. In presenting this petition, we should like to call your attention to certain facts regarding public opinion. With very rare exceptions, everyone wished to sign; a great many thanked us for the opportunity; others protested that it was not strong enough, or should have been done sooner. The opinion was repeatedly expressed that a system must be devised, whereby the welfare of a well-planned village would be served; so that the self-interest of a limited number of property owners should not rule the village."

"We understand that a planning committee has been appointed for this purpose. We should like to know what action it has been taking, what plans it has recommended, and what is being done by the commission to further these plans. We should like to know what other trees whenever and wherever possible. We should also like to know what effort is being made by the village to safeguard trees which have had to have large roots cut off in widening streets where the trees still remain; by such methods as painting, cementing the holes, etc. It has been noted that the excavators, in many cases, are very careless with the roots and branches of the trees."

"We do not believe that the replanting of a small tree to replace a fine old one of years of growth is in any way adequate, but we do believe that, where the removal of certain trees is strictly unavoidable, the replanting of trees should be the practice of the village."

"We have learned that there is wholesale rejoicing in the surrounding villages at the denuding of our village of its charm and beauty, believing that it will stimulate the growth of the villages which are making a supreme effort to retain their native beauty."

Other persons in the audience endorsed the petition and added pleas that the trees be saved."

Two contracts for street improvements in Birmingham were awarded Monday night by the village commission.

The Taylor Construction company was given the work of paving Washington boulevard, North, lawn and Southlawn avenues. The price is \$19,107.20.

The George W. Smith company was given the graveling and laying of curb and gutter on Arlington road, Shirley drive, Dorchester, Kimberly and Winthrop. The bid was \$26,518.58.

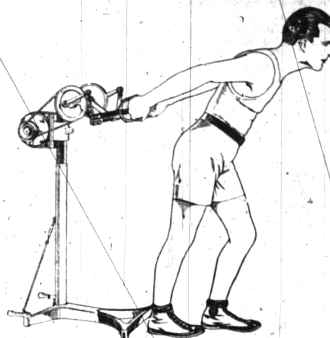
