Coach Issues Call For More Gridders On Eve Of Opener

Twenty More Football Players Needed To Round Out Squad, Johnson Declares; Holly Here Tomorrow

The Maroon and White squad meets on to Pines field at 8:30 p. m. tomorrow for the opening football game of the season with Holly. The encounter is expected by Coach George Johnson to tell more definitely where improvement must be made in preparing the crew for a heavy schedule of 12 contests.

Appeals For Players
The small turnout for practice and the lack of competition for the variety positions are seen as the major difficulties to be overcome this season by Coach Johnson who draws attention to the small number of candidates this year in comparison with other years.

An appeal to the student body at Baldwin High School has been

made by Coach Johnson who declares that 20 more candidates are needed to round out the squad. "Formerly we have always had at least 50 boys reporting for preliminary practice but a lack of enthusiasm seems to exist this year. This should not necessarily discourage prospects of a good season, for, although the squad is light and many positions are being filled by inexperienced men, development can be made to attain a team of merit, such as has been shown in the seasons past. More candidates, logically, would supply more competition and make the solution to the development problem more simple," he concluded.
