Bloomfield Hills Horticultural Society Exhibits
Sept. 15

Plans are being completed today for the annual flower and plant show of the Bloomfield Hills Horticultural Society to be held Sept. 15 in the Baldwin High School.

Exhibits will be divided into eight groups: collections of cut flowers, vases of perennials, vases of annuals, roses, dahlias, gladioli, fruit and vegetables.

All entries for the exhibit must be in the hands of Arthur Claxton, of Bird avenue, secretary, three days previous to the exhibition. According to the rules pertaining to the show, exhibitors must be in position at 11 a. m.; no competitor shall receive more than one premium in any one class; and in classes where less than two exhibits are shown, first prize may be withheld by judges.
