## SCHOOLS STRESS ARITHMETIC

New Tests, Practices To Be Introduced When Classes Open

More weight is to be attached to the study of arithmetic in the Birmingham public schools this year, according to announcement made today by Clarence Vliet, superintendent of schools. The Lennes test and practice sheets will be introduced for supplementary work, Mr. Vliet said. The first half of the grade will be used in both B and A section the first semester, he said. The tablets will be sold at cost to all pupils and will furnish necessary paper for most of the arithmetic work during the year, according to the present plan of the school board. These tests have been widely used in nearby cities and with excellent results, Mr. Vliet pointed out.

"We plan to continue the study of the new arithmetic test," Mr. Vliet said, "and to furnish the principals in turn with some of the new sets and ask their opinions on the matter."

## COUNTY NURSING CHANGES MADE

Staff And System Of Work In Oakland County Rearranged

A thorough reorganization of the plan on which the Oakland County Department of Health operates its nursing department is announced today by Dr. John D. Monroe, county health commissioner.

Explaining the new plan, he said: "The Oakland County Department of Health has worked out a plan of generalized nursing service for Oakland County instead of the specialized service in use last year. In the past a nurse has been assigned to a particular phase of service to the exclusion of other branches," he explains.

"Under the new system, the county will be divided into four districts with a nurse in each. The duties of each district nurse will cover nursing activities in prenatal hygiene, infant hygiene, social hygiene, tuberculosis and instruction to the family regarding communicable diseases. Besides care, of course, will not be included. The nursing service of the County Health Department has been extended to eight schools throughout the county, giving health supervision to 2,350 school children."

"The generalized system offers many advantages, prominent among which is the elimination of duplicated calls. In making calls on tuberculosis patients, the district nurse gains a better insight into home conditions and thus may be of more service to the family."

"The nursing service provided will be somewhat limited in the beginning because of a lack of nurses. However, it will provide an outline of the work to be done and it is already under the right direction that can be increased in the future."

"The county will be divided into four geographical districts and one nurse assigned to each. District No. 4, being that district which includes Royal Oak, Ferndale, Birmingham, etc., will not be completely covered because of the fact that it is already under the supervision of the school nurses, Detroit Community Union, and the Visiting Nurses association. "It is expected that the system of generalized nursing service will be in effect by Sept. 15."

## ZOO NEIGHBORS COMPLAIN OF PICNICKERS

New parking regulations for the territory around the Detroit Zoo are expected to go into effect immediately following action of the commission in Royal Oak when neighbors complained of the many hundreds of machines parked in the neighborhood.

An edict is also issued against the practice of eating lunches in autos parked in that neighborhood, Huntington Woods residents told the commission that in private driveways, ate their lunches and threw the refuse on private lawns.

Director John T. Millen of the Zoo has asked additional police from Detroit and the state to help enforce the new laws.

FACTS ON PLAN TO SAVE  
SUBMARINES ASKED

The sinking of the Italian submarine F-14, and the great speed

with which it was brought up out of a depth of 130 feet of water within 34 hours calls to mind the sinking of our S-51 and S-4. Soon after Lieutenant Commander Ellsberg salvaged the S-51, he submitted to the navy department, through former Admiral Funkett, on Oct. 5, 1925, important recommendations concerning the salvage process which, if followed, might have saved the lives of the heroic crew of the S-51. His prophecy came true; the department failed to carry out his suggestions and even split up the pontoons used on the S-51 over Ellsberg's objections, and thus rendered ineffectual the most important instrumentality used in submarine salvage.

I now ask whether Lieutenant

Commander Ellsberg's recommendations have, since the S-4 disaster, been carried out or does his report remain pigeonholed. Apparently, the Italians did practically what Commander Ellsberg suggested. It is important for the American public to know what action or non-action the department has taken in reference thereto. I do not want this to be considered in the nature of an unkindly criticism. I earnestly desire the facts.

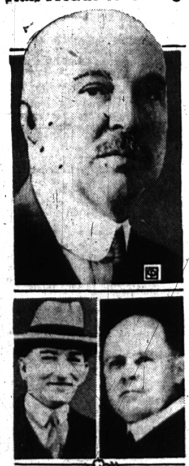
