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'WILD' DRIVERS BECOME FEWER

Recklessness Decreases During Month, Police Report

A decline in the number of reckless drivers and speeders with an increase in traffic signal violations is indicated today in a police report for August. The total amount of fines collected in police court was \$287, higher than the July report of \$229.

Reckless drivers numbered 33 and speeders, 38. This is an appreciable drop from the preceding month in which reckless driving fines numbered 51, and speeding, 54. Sixty violators of traffic signals were arrested by patrolmen in comparison with 49 for July. The number of the latter accounts for the increase in the total amount of fines levied. Among the other violations registered overtime parking and parking violations rank high with a combined total of 35.

Twenty-nine accidents were recorded in the report and 13 business doors were found open by patrolmen.
