

LIBRARY NOW MORE POPULAR

Circulation At Baldwin Doubles, Report Shows

Circulation for the past month at the Baldwin Public Library is almost double that for August last

year according to the reports made public today, by Mrs. Nancy R. Thomas, librarian. The circulation for last month was 4974 with a gain of 2152 books over that of the corresponding month last year. Ninety-one new borrowers registered this month at the library, and 334 books were added, 175 of these being for adults and the remainder juvenile books.

EXPECT 130 AT CRANBROOK

Hills School To Get Under Way Sept. 25, According To Plans

Approximately 130 students will register at the opening of Cranbrook School Sept. 25, according to announcement made today by Dr. W. D. Stevens, headmaster. All students are to report to the school before 3 p. m. on that date, Stevens said, and be assigned to rooms and register. After this the proceeding will be much the same as that of last year, he pointed out, the boys going to the study hall to sign their pledge not to smoke, getting their books at the store and being assigned to desks in the study hall.

Another form is being added this year, which is known as the fourth form, corresponding to the tenth grade and which augments last year's enrollment of 78 students by approximately 52 students. There will be four forms at Cranbrook this year: the first, second, third, and fourth corresponding very nearly to the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth grades.

Classes will officially open following the assembly at 8:45 in the study hall on Sept. 26, when Dr. Stevens will greet the students and familiarize them with the aims of Cranbrook.

With the growth of the school, additions will be made to the teaching staff and this year sees several new instructors in the faculty, which for the year 1928-29 is as follows:

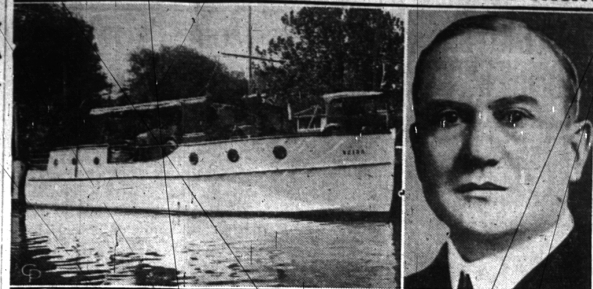

WORKMEN BREAK PRODUCTION RECORD DESPITE INTENSE HEAT

Last Aug. 9 Pontiac's weather man recorded an official "high" of 88 degrees and the entire city sweltered.

But that day, despite the heat, a group of inspired men, employed in the Pontiac plant of the Oakland Motor Car company, rolled up their sleeves, turned to with vim and within five hours rolled 609 completed Pontiacs at the assembly line, breaking all previous production records.

The new record was announced today by H. R. Nickerson, works manager.

The merit of the achievement is illustrated by the fact that the previous five hour production record at the plant, 570 cars, was broken by 39. The previous record was established last June.

Six hundred nine autos in five hours means 122 every hour or slightly more than two a minute. One completed auto every 29 1/2 seconds. Credit for the achievement goes not only to workers on the assembly line but to members of all departments who speeded up their particular phase of construction work to produce the materials necessary to the record.

"The new record is especially

termed so frequently that it is not surprising." Mr. Nickerson attributed the record to the fact that there has been little labor turnover at the Pontiac plant during recent months and the present corps of workmen possesses the skill of experience.

Workers Continue Excavating For Woodward Avenue Structure

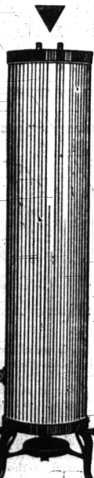
Work on excavation for the new village post office is proceeding on schedule today and indications are that it will be completed by Dec.
