He confessed, police say, to the robbery of the Saunders-Buick garage at 602 south Woodward avenue of \$100 and the taking of a coupe and \$5.50 from the Shaw Motor Sales at 700 south Woodward avenue.

The same night, police say, the pair looted the Reo Sales rooms in Royal Oak and committed one burglary in Pontiac.

The car stolen from Birmingham has not been recovered.

Birmingham, Michigan March 11, 1929.

A special meeting of the Board of Education was held in the office at 8 p. m.

Present: R. J. Coryell, Ray A. Palmer, Fred V. Quarton, Leigh Lynch and Guy W. Jensen.

The minutes of all previous meetings since the last regular were approved.

Sketch plans for a two-story building on the Barnum site were presented by Architect F. D. Madison and discussed at length. Mr. Madison reported that the estimated cost of the proposed building would be \$225,000 of which \$100,000 is available from the bonds authorized July 11, 1927 leaving a balance of \$125,000 to be provided hereafter determined by the Board of Education.

Moved by Quarton supported by Palmer that the following bond issues shall be submitted to the qualified voters of District No. 1, Oakland and Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, at a date to be hereafter determined by the Board of Education.

- \$190,000 to build and equip new grade and junior high school building on the Barnum site.
- \$35,000 to build and equip a swimming pool in connection with a new grade and junior high school building on the Barnum site.

Nays: None.

The next meeting was set for March 25 and the architect was directed to have the revised sketches of the last layout of the Barnum building ready at that time.
