BUTLER URGES LOCAL SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN

Probation Officer Would Have County Provide For Sub-Normals

REPORT IS SUBMITTED

Need of an Oakland County school for feeble minded children was told by James Butler, Pontiac probation officer, Tuesday in a talk before the Oakland County Council of Women at the Community House.

He told of the establishment of a vocational school in the Detention Home that is now under construction and briefly sketched the work of his office, citing many cases that had come to his attention.

Mrs. Otto Sachse, Pontiac, reported on work of the court committee. She declared that arrangements were being made for a conference of the committee and Oakland County judges.

The trip of the executive board to the Oakland County tuberculosis hospital was reported by Mrs. O. W. Dawson, of Ferndale, and the work of the organization outlined.

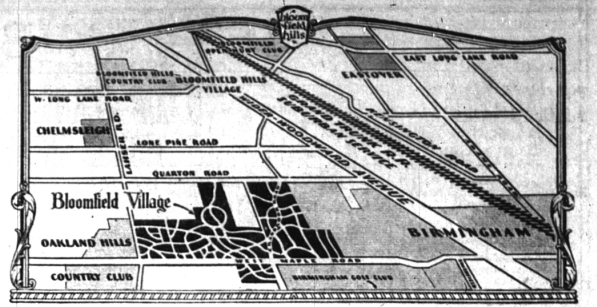

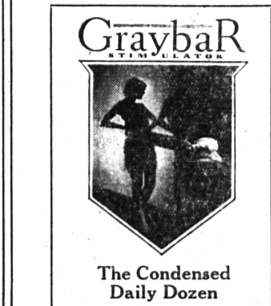
