Birmingham and Hills members of the Woman's International League for Peace and Freedom are planning to attend the annual meeting of the organization being held April 24 through 27 in the Hotel Statler, Detroit.

Mrs. George T. Hendrix, chairman of the Michigan branch W. I. L. Mrs. Frederick Holt, Mrs. Kathleen Jennison Lowrie, Mrs. Elizabeth and Miss Dorothy Detroit comprise the committee on arrangements.

Jane Addams, international president will be the principal speaker at the banquet scheduled for 7 p. m. next Wednesday at the Statler Hotel. Miss Emily Greene Balch, national president and former member of the Wellesley college faculty and Miss Agnes McPhail, of Ontario, Canada, only woman member of the Canadian parliament will also appear on the program. Judge Frank Murphy, of Detroit, will speak on "The Peace Question."

The formal opening of the convention will take place at 10 a. m. Thursday when Mrs. Walter G. Judd, president, secretary, regional director and credentials committee members will return she will address reports will be heard and at 4 p. m. there will be a round table for leaders of women's organizations. Mrs. Ellen LaMotte will address the group on "Traffic in Opium."

Since that time it has grown and includes members from many other than the original 12 countries which were then represented. Great Britain, Germany, Italy, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Austria, Hungary, and Canada. It has held an annual meeting since 1916 in various cities of Europe and one in Washington. This is the first time it has met in Detroit.
