Junior High Schools Practice For "Little Six" Games

Baldwin and Adams junior high schools joint baseball and track teams are at practice today in preparation for the "Little Six" championship meet to be held May 9 in Royal Oak. The teams are being coached by Ernest Engle, of Baldwin, and Coach Elmer Wiseman, of Adams.

The Birmingham teams will be members of the Little Six league, which is composed of teams from: Ferndale, Royal Oak, Hazel Park, Berkeley, Adams and Baldwin schools of Birmingham. Each team plays every other team once making a five game schedule. All ball games will be played on Wednesday.

The track teams of the schools in the "Little Six" are divided into two classes, 70 yards weights, including boys weighing over 100 lbs. and the lightweight, over 100 lbs. who weigh under 100 lbs.

One boy may enter one track event and two field events not including the relay, the coaches announced.

Plans are being completed for the events of the Royal Oak meet. The program includes: 70 yards hurdles, run with five hurdles, 15 yards to first hurdle, 10 yards to the second and 20 to the tape; 75 yard dash; running high jump; running broad jump; eight pound shot; hammer discus; quarter mile relay, of four men.
