

# RECORD CROWD AT Y CAMPS ARE EXPECTED

Two Sites Available For Village Boys This Summer

## NEW CLUBHOUSE OPEN

A record attendance at the Y. M. C. A. camps for Birmingham boys this summer is expected by Robert D. Lynd, secretary of the organization in Birmingham, who is taking reservations for the camps. The short term camp is at Lake Copneconic, five miles north of Fenton. Village boys between the ages of 11 and 15 will have the use of the camp between July 21 and 31. The quota is 72. The new clubhouse at this camp will be in use for the first time this summer. Mr. Lynd said. It cost \$25,000 and contains a dining room with a seating capacity of 125 and a large lounge room, which also may be used as an auditorium. This camp site is the property of the Flint Y. M. C. A. and is being used by the Birmingham group until the selection of their site is made. Camp Hayo-went-ha at Torch Lake, 300 miles north of here, has a capacity of 150 and is open to Birmingham boys between late June and Sept. There are two camp periods divided into the four and eight weeks classes. Included on the program is the possibility of canoe trips through the north of Canada. The trips will last two weeks, the boys spending a week in the camp before and after the travel. This camp is 26 years old and will be under the direction of college men, Mr. Lynd said.

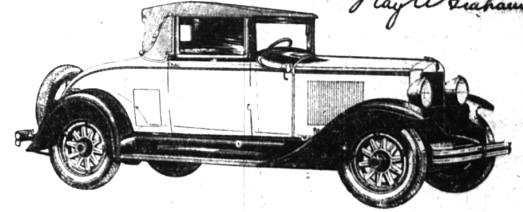

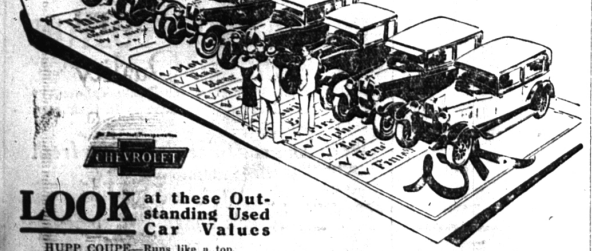
