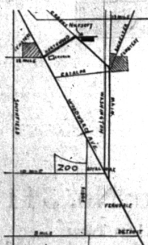

Southfield Township Woman Dies At Home, Age 63

Mrs. Lucy Hooper Duffy, 63 years old, a native of Southfield Township, was buried yesterday at 2 p. m. from her late home on the Twelve Mile road. Burial was in Southfield Burg cemetery with the Rev. Edwin M. Thompson, pastor of the Southfield Methodist Church, of which Mrs. Duffy was a member, officiating.

She died early Monday at St. Joseph's Mercy hospital, Pontiac, following an illness of nearly three years duration. She was a sister of Mrs. Fred Harris, of Birmingham.

Mrs. Duffy was the wife of the late, John Duffy, well known Southfield farmer. She spent her entire life in that village, receiving her education in the Southfield schools, later marrying John Duffy and moving to what is now known as the old Duffy homestead on the Twelve Mile road where she lived until the time of her death. She was the daughter of Oakland County pioneers, her father, Barney Hooper, a one-time Southfield blacksmith, playing a colorful part in the history of the town.

Surviving are: two children, Mrs. Harold Noble, Farmington; Ralph Hooper, Southfield; a sister, Mrs. William Davis of Southfield; a brother, Clyde Hooper, of Southfield; a brother, Henry Hooper, of Farmington, besides Mrs. Harris.

WOMAN DIES AT WARREN

Last rites were held Tuesday at 11 a. m. in Warren for Mrs. Abigail Caroline Hoxsey, mother of Miss Margaret Hoxsey, formerly a resident of Birmingham. Burial was in Warren cemetery.

Mrs. Hoxsey died Saturday in Warren, where she has resided for more than 40 years. She was 62 years old.

Mr. and Mrs. John Spencer visited Saturday and Sunday at the home of Mr. Spencer's uncle in Chicago.

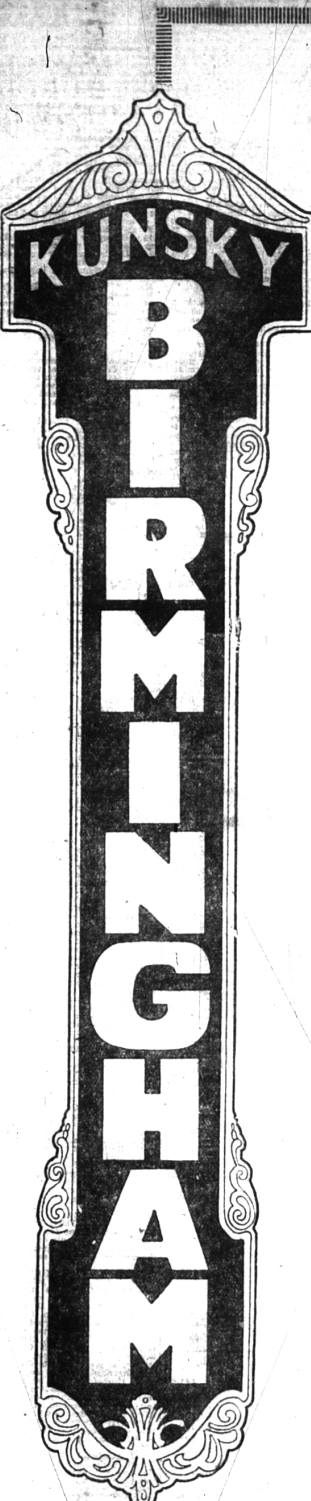
BIG BEAVER
