Oakland County School Commissioner At Annual Teachers' Session

E. J. Lederle, of Royal Oak, for the past six years Oakland County School Commissioner, next Monday will open the annual meeting of the Michigan County School Commissioners Association at the Central State Teachers College at Mt. Pleasant. Mr. Lederle, recognized as one of the foremost school commissioners in Michigan, is president of the Association and will preside at all sessions, lasting until Wednesday.

Centralization in state school control, county unit legislation and the school tax burden, are topics on which discussion and addresses will center. The usual problem of consolidation, transportation, supervision, and financing of schools will be brought before the convention.

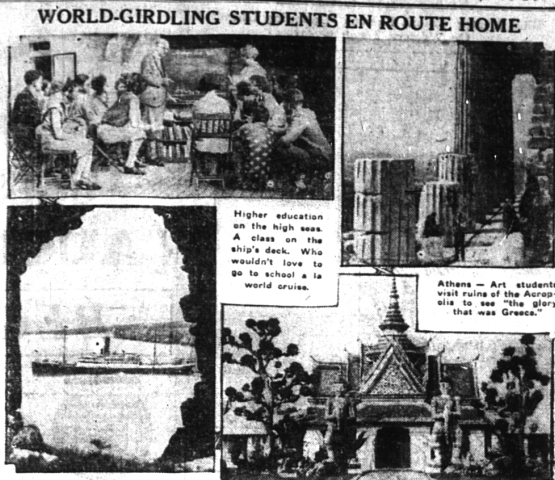

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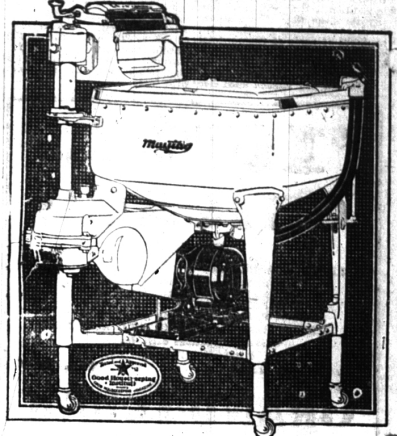

TREES AID FIGHT WITH SAND DUNES

College Experts Seek To Prevent Shore Line From Nearby Farms

East Lansing, Aug. 1.—Trees are playing a leading role in men's fight to keep the shifting sand dunes and the college shore from spreading disaster over farm lands, roads, and drainage ditches of the state's western border. That many of the dunes are traveling "landward," often at the rate of several feet a year, is an established fact. Effective ways of checking the wandering tendencies of the errant acres are being a real problem, and the usefulness of artificial tree plantings in this work is being determined this summer through a survey by forestry officials of Michigan State College.

Several hundred thousand trees were planted on the dunes 16 years ago, all the way from Holland to Petoskey, and the college foresters are checking this summer to see how much these trees have grown and how effective they have proved in slowing the relentless march of the sand. Carolina poplar, box elder, and some of the pines give evidence of being best suited for the shifting sand plantings according to Prof. A. K. Chittenden, head of the M. S. C. forest service. Methods of establishing plantations must vary with the character of the dunes and the exposure.

The dunes themselves are said to have increased greatly in height and importance with the development of Michigan for summer resort purposes.
