## FOUNDED SCHOOL

For many years he remained in Detroit practicing dentistry. In 1874 Dr. Shattuck and a group of professional friends purchased a former beer saloon at the intersection of Cass and Grand streets on Grand avenue. Here they founded the institution then known as the Michigan College of Dental Surgery. Eventually the school merged with the Detroit College of Medicine which has been run in conjunction with the Harper Hospital. Here Dr. Shattuck was made dean of dentistry, a post which he held until his departure for California 20 years ago. Dr. Fred Crawford of Dr. H. H. Rainey, of Birmingham, were among his pupils.

## See Possibilities

Dr. Shattuck sees even greater possibilities in the future of dentistry as a profession than in the days of his youth. "The special field of today," he said, "is not only a greater opportunity. In my day the general practitioner treated all ailments from the toes to the scalp," he said.

Women will soon find dentistry in excellent field, he believes. "They are particularly susceptible to oral surgery. Women have the brain and the body, and are mentioned the pile of fence rails once off in his yard as a payment.

Four generations of the family were represented by the guests present from: Marine City, River Rouge, Bay City, Halfway, Caro, Akron, Flint and Detroit.

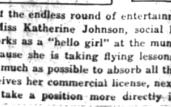
