Arrested After Chase Here, 17-Year-Old Boy Fights Case

Andy Cline, 17 years old, charged with transporting liquor through Birmingham, will be tried in circuit court's September term. He was bound over, under bail of \$500 by Justice Floyd S. Buck after an examination last Friday.

Cline was arrested after a chase by Patrolman George Stephenson and Delyle Service. The officers testified they had traveled 67 miles an hour to overtake him. A search of the car revealed several containers of alleged whiskey.

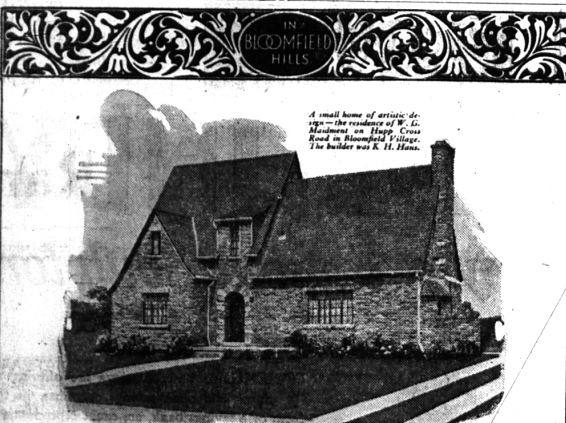
