

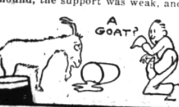
# Firemen Champions In Twilight Ball

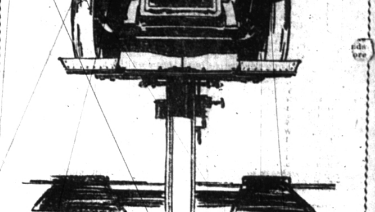
