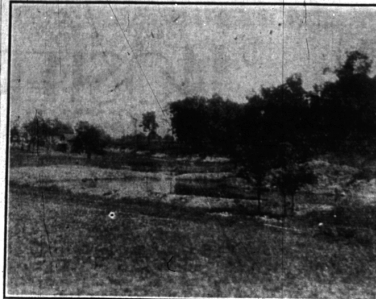

ARTIFICIAL PONDS

MAN CAUGHT IN HILLS CHASE

Birmingham Officers Assist Bloomfield Hills Police In Man Hunt

Roy Randolph, negro, aged 27, awaits hearing in Justice Buck's court today following his arrest in Bloomfield Hills last night after a chase participated in by Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills police.

Randolph was driving a truck on Woodward avenue through Bloomfield Hills and was hailed by traffic officer Banks of the Hills force for driving without lights. For some reason, Randolph was frightened and without bringing his truck to a complete stop, leaped to the ground and ran into a patch of woods near the road. He succeeded in evading the pursuing officer and the assistance of Birmingham police was solicited in the hunt.

Officers Service and Stevenson assisted the color and assisted in the two-hour search through the woods and nearby fields.

A tip from a passing motorist led the searchers toward Pontiac and Service and Stevenson came upon Randolph near St. Joseph's hospital. They returned to Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills jail where he awaits a hearing.

A special election is to be held Monday to vote on the annexation of land to assure the village of an adequate water supply.

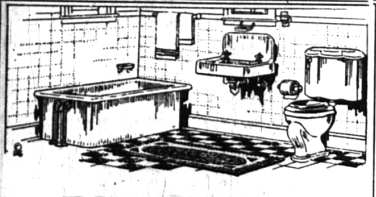
