Vegetables, flowers and fruit will mingle with the state's best at the annual show of the Grosse Pointe and Eastern Michigan Horticultural Societies to be held at the Neighborhood Club, Grosse Pointe Village, Sept. 6, 7 and 8.

State winners from Bloomfield Hills, Palmer Woods, Indian Village and Grosse Pointe are entering choice exhibits from their gardens and will be in attendance at the formal opening, Sept. 6 at 5 p. m.

From that time the exhibit will be open to the public. A schedule has just been issued by the show committee covering all varieties of plants, flowers and vegetables now in season, as well as large groups of plants and annuals arranged for effect.

One class for artistic arrangements is open only to members of the Garden club of Michigan, the Little Garden club honorary members of the Society.
