BIRDS RETURN TO AIR

Canaries Trained to Accompany Radio Trio, Broadcasting Daily

New York—If you don't care much for fairy tales, better tune in on the sports page or the movie reviews. This is going to be just like one. Almost three years ago Elizabeth Freeman lived in Washington with her two lovely little canaries, Blue Boy and Big Boy. Every morning bright and early—

at 7:45 to be exact—she tuned in on "The Parnassus Trio," from New York, to listen to the three charming young ladies that make up the ensemble. One morning Miss Freeman realized suddenly that the birds were chirping right along with the trio and—more astounding still—they were actually almost on pitch with the melody. For their own amusement Miss Freeman began to train Big Boy and Blue Boy. Soon they would sing up to stop singing at a signal, and in a little while had a regular repertoire of numbers that they could do right along with the radio.

Pass Audition Test Miss Freeman came to New York and happened to mention what fun she was having with the two birds to a man interested in a broadcasting studio. He urged her to bring them to New York for an AUDITION! Big Boy and Blue Boy were put through the same kind of formal audition that anyone who broadcasts would be. And they passed with feathers flying.

Now, for more than a year, the two remarkable little birds have traveled the subway every morning to be in the studio at 7:45 to earn their board and keep. It is very early for even a bird to be up in this man's town. And, oh so hard on the three poor little working girls that accompany the canary duo.

Incidentally, one gets so much interested in the fact that two birds can sing dozens of songs in such a professional manner that one almost forgets to tell about the three lovely little ladies that make up the Parnassus trio. Olga Serliss, brilliant and beautiful youngster, heads the group at the piano, and arranges all the programs. She is from Chicago. Christine Phillipson, violinist, blonde and striking, is from Atlanta. The regular third member of the trio is Ana Drittell, from Russia, who is now in Europe. Genieve Lewis, cellist, has taken her place for the summer.
