Nielson killed his wife and four children by gas, then committed suicide by drinking poison, after setting fire to the bodies. More than 400 persons crowded into the church for the last sad rites. The jam outside and within the church was so heavy that a number of women fainted and had to be carried to clear spaces nearby where they were revived.

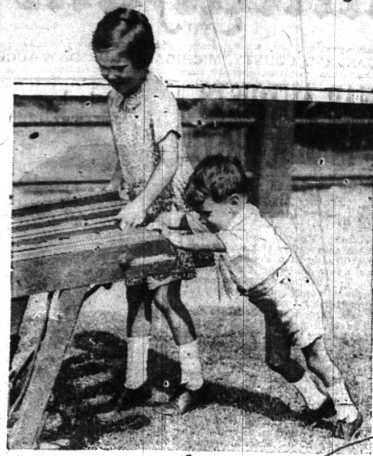

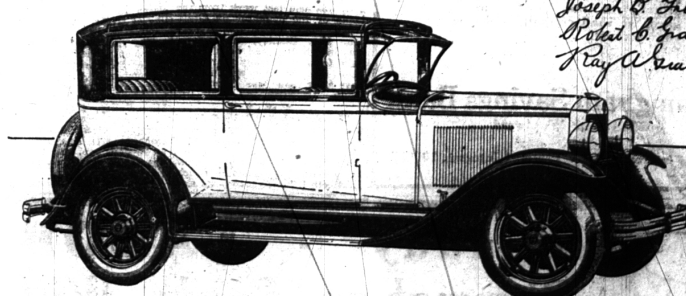
