FINAL TRIBUTE IS GIVEN TO F. HAGERMAN

President of First State Savings Bank Dies After Long Illness

VILLAGE PAYS HOMAGE

Birmingham Tuesday paid tribute to one of its oldest and most prominent residents, Francis Hagerman, 83, who died Sunday at his residence, 419 north Woodward avenue. Stores and business houses throughout the village closed between 4 and 5 p. m. the hour of the funeral.

The service was held at the residence with Elder Hugh Peden, of Fort Huron, officiating. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

At the time of his death Mr. Hagerman was president of the First State Savings bank, an office which he held since 1922.

Owned Store Here

For 42 years Mr. Hagerman owned a store in the village, which he operated at the time of his death. He was a native of Mt. Bethel, Pa., coming to Bloomfield Hills, a Cleveland agent, and after that he married Rosetta Daines and moved to the village.

In 1860 he was named president of the village, and in an office which he held for 30 years. He also served as village postmaster during the Groves Cleveland administration.

Active in Village

Nearly 18 years ago he sold the store, moving to California. In a few years he returned, however, and repurchased the property, later operating a general store at West Maple and Woodward.

Besides his widow, Rosetta Hagerman, he leaves two daughters, Miss Gertrude Hagerman, living at home, and Mrs. Thomas Hagerman, of Birmingham, Michigan, artist, both of Birmingham.

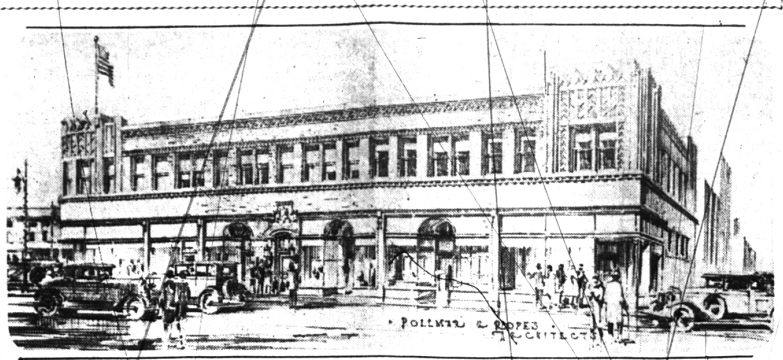

WATER SUPPLY AT NEW HIGH, PARRY SAYS

Assault Charges Placed Against Well-Known Birmingham Man

John Miller, 41 years old, owner of a farm on the west Maple road opposite the Oakland Hills country club, today will be arraigned in municipal court, Pontiac, on a charge of felonious assault, in connection with the shooting of three youths in his orchard Monday afternoon.

TANK REMOVAL SEEN

Birmingham, upon the addition of its newest 1,000 gallon per minute well at the intersection of West Maple avenue water works, has more water than at any time in its history, and the time has also come, or is about here, when the elevated water storage tank may be removed. This is what Village Manager James W. Parry told local Rotarians in a talk before them at the First Baptist Church Monday noon.

Mr. Parry traced, briefly, the history of wells in Birmingham, citing the first 60-ft. shallow wells installed in 1890 when the old west Maple avenue water works, operated by steam pumps, was built. He declared that the rapid growth of Birmingham during the past 10 years, had made it necessary to go into deeper strata for a water supply, thus eliminating the steam pumps, and substituting deep well electrically driven pumps.

NEWEST WELL NOW IN USE

Derby Source Supplying Villagers 1,000,000 Gallons Of Water Daily

Birmingham today is using the new Derby well at Derby and Eaton roads, for its water supply and is consuming about 1,000,000 gallons every 24 hours. Village Manager James W. Parry reports.

The water was officially turned on last Saturday and the well has been in use constantly since that time. The well, land and pump house will cost the village approximately \$25,000. It has been under construction since last December by the Harmon-Ness company of South Bend, Ind., and is of the gravel well type.

PLAN WOODWARD TRAFFIC SURVEY

Speedier traffic on Woodward avenue between Detroit and Pontiac is the aim of a traffic survey to be started today by Detroit police and the Detroit Automobile club following a meeting of officials of southern Oakland County Tuesday in Detroit. Synchronization of all traffic signals between Pontiac and Detroit is one of the aims, it is announced.
