SALE ON TAGS GOING SLOWLY
Only 62 Sets Of Licenses Sold By Police Here
With only 62 license plates sets sold so far this year at the Birmingham Police Department, police officials are fearful that this year, as usual, there will be a last minute rush for the tags before Jan. 1.

The license plates are on sale at the police department every week day between 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. According to Chief Orva J. Tuttle, 24 hour service will be made. The new plates went on sale Dec. 2 at the same rates as the ones charged last year. The matter of attaching the new plates was left entirely to enforcement officers by the Secretary of State at Lansing this year, and under a new ruling, motorists purchasing new cars may use their license plates for 15 months on a year's license.

Last year, almost 1,400 plates were purchased here.

REALTORS ASKED TO PRESENT PLAN
Commission Seeks Information On Request To Lift Restrictions
Hearing on the request of the Fitzsimons & Galvin Co. for a lifting of the building restrictions in Birmingham Gardens subdivision because the Grand Truck right-of-way intersects the property, was postponed until Dec. 16 Monday.

The request was made for the real estate company through James W. Parry, village manager. The commission decided that the passing of such a resolution sanctioning the removal of restrictions should not be done without the consent of adjoining property holders. Following a discussion of the problem Commissioner Lee A. White suggested that the subdivision appear at the next meeting for further discussion of the problem.

Representatives of the Fitzsimons firm have met with the planning commission, and have shown a willingness to cooperate with the village in working out a plan for the best interests of the village and lot owners in that vicinity; it was stated. Commissioner White and others said that it is a matter that should be taken before the planning commission, as well as the village commission.
