

# DOPE TRAFFIC IS DISCUSSED

### Exchanges Hear Detroit Police Address On Narcotic Evil

Ed Kunath, Detroit police inspector in charge of the narcotic division, was the principal speaker at the Exchange club meeting at Lone Pine Inn Tuesday noon when he went into the present evils of the traffic in dope that so vigorously seems to be permeating America. With him was one of his detective-sergeants, Gene Kinney, who showed various opiates and the pipes and syringes used to consume them.

Inspector Kunath, who was introduced by Exchangeite Ed Watson, local automobile dealer, related the history of the opium traffic since its first growth in China in the seventh century, when Arab traders introduced the poppy. China, stated Inspector Kunath, has been wrongfully accused of being the exploiter of the opium traffic, whereas in 1837 the Chinese government, realizing that its people were too greatly under the influence of opium, passed a law that made it illegal even to grow a poppy in the backyard. upon China a war by the people interested in the British East Indies; China was defeated and has since made brave efforts to stem the tide of the opium traffic within its borders," stated the speaker. "Many people think that China today produces practically all of the opium of the world; most of it comes from the British East Indies, from Bolivia, and Peru. Today one-fourth of Great Britain's revenue is obtained from the sale of opium."

"The average cost of using dope per day to a confirmed addict is about five dollars, for five grains of morphine, or some other opiate," stated Inspector Kunath. "It is hard to stop the increase in the dope traffic because it is now big business, with agents out in society seeking to make new addicts and buy the stuff. Especially true is this in some dance halls and in high school and other educational circles. A new dope known as marajuana, which looks like dried grass, is made into cigarettes and sold to high school boys and girls."

**Pity the "Dope"**  
 Inspector Kunath declared that the dope addict is deserving of pity and sympathy, and not condemnation for, he believes a "dope addict once were three people, and the pity of it is that one never knows when even his own boy or girl may, either through a dope agent, or through the use of opiates to relieve pain, become addicts themselves. We treat addicts as human beings; if we catch them at just the proper time and offer them the needed medical or financial assistance, they may be turned from their ways and become useful citizens."

Strengthening of narcotic laws in the United States during recent years has aided greatly in combating this dope evil, concluded Inspector Kunath.
