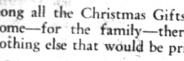
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PUCK CHASERS HOLD RAFFLE

BALDWIN FIVE DEFEATS DEARBORN WITH VICTORY

Engel's Cagers Beat Dearborn High School 15-10; Pontiac Next

COME FROM BEHIND

By GORTON GREENE Coach Engel's Baldwin High school basketball quintet opened the 1935-36 season with a 15-10 victory over Dearborn High school Friday night on the opponents' court. The Maroon basket ballers swung into action against Dearborn on the Pontiac court at 8:30 p. m. Dearborn went into a 3-point lead when Kandi rimmed the sphere from close range and H. Smith followed with a point on a free shot. Birmingham took over with a basket by Chandler. Berger sank a free shot and Chandler dropped the ball through the basket for another two points. Berger made the score 6-3 as the first quarter ended. Birmingham in the lead that Dearborn failed to overcome during the remainder of the game.

Birmingham scored four points in the second quarter to Dearborn's three and in the third episode rang up one to nothing, setting the score at the end of the third, 11-6.

Neither team had any particular starts during the first quarter. The Orange and Black put a usual fourth period final spurt but were completely shoved under by the Maroon barrage. Dearborn played a decidedly inferior game compared with that of the Baldwinites. The Orange attack that opened the game was not much to speak of but ran up three points before the Baldwin five got underway. Both teams played to disadvantage on a too-recently oiled floor and lost the ball several times during the second quarter. The aged and inexperienced players of Dearborn from both schools played the game minus members still in the high school squad.

Ladd bore the burden of the major part of the Birmingham defense and stood out on every possible occasion as a gallant opponent. Berger and Chandler led playing good basketball. Wedge and Dixon shared the mediocre honors. Dixon and Wedge got mixed up in many tight situations during the game but managed to recover the ball. Dally, who had replaced Dixon, got off a good pass in the third part, heaving the ball from the midst of opponents bearing down upon him. The Baldwin machine started to click toward the last of the initial period and buried the opponents' 3-0 lead with a 6-3 lead for themselves before the whistle ended the quarter.

Dearborn took the jump in the second quarter and Hutchinson missed two shots in succession at the rim, firing recklessly. The Maroons took the offensive and marched down the floor. Berger took the ball from Kandi on his way down the hardwood. Kandi fouled and Berger made the point. Chandler took the sphere but missed a dog-shot. The ball went back into play from team to team, neither team scoring. The second quarter was clearly Birmingham's. Every player showed up good for the Maroons, making few errors.

Dearborn held Birmingham to only one point in the third quarter and scored nothing themselves. The Maroon pass attack stood out in the third and opened up so when Dally, Ladd and Chandler faced the ball over the heads of the home men. The ball went through a series of three passes in the one attack. The ball was thrown from the most difficult of positions but each time met the intended mark.

Dearborn Shoots Wildly Dearborn attempted to even the score. Evans broke up the first drive and dribbled to mid-floor and passed to Ladd. Dearborn lost all three times as many shots aimed at the basket. Dearborn shot wildly throughout the period. Dearborn's form, Dixon led, scoring four points. Ladd scored spectacularly in the first period. He grabbed the ball and turned around, dribbled a few feet and then shot at an angle. A pass sent the ball to Chandler. Berger bounced it to another two points, making the score 15-6.
