

TRAFFIC DEATH RATE MOUNTS

Oakland County Is Third Highest With 74 Dead In 10 Months

An increase of 18 traffic fatalities during the first 10 months of the year in Oakland County as compared with the first 10 months in 1928 has been reported by the Detroit Automobile Club in its campaign to further interest in the new State Traffic Code which was passed by the State Legislature last March.

A survey of the State by Counties shows that Oakland County with 74 automobile deaths was third highest, Wayne and Monroe Counties being first and second respectively. In Wayne County there was an increase of 72 deaths and in Monroe County, 36 deaths. The increase for the entire state was 185 and the total of dead was 1,245 as compared with 1,060 in 1928.

Sports Writer Picks Versatile All-America Eleven, Combining Shifty Runners, Plungers, Kickers, Passers And Pass Receivers

THE time of year when the expert goes off by himself to the quietness of a padded cell to glorify America's horde of collegiate football players.

While he smokes long black cigars and drinks cup after cup of strong coffee, the expert consults a long column of newspaper clippings and scribbles many notes which are torn up. He reads and re-reads the letters and recommendations of his henchmen stationed in various sections of the country.

This goes on for several days, during which there is a loss of appetite, sleep and weight. At last the expert emerges, a smile plays over his haggard features and he announces that the 1929 All-America eleven are completed.

UNFORTUNATELY, only 11 men comprise a football team, even if it is an All-America group. Because it seems unfair to name 11 players as supreme, we have selected two other teams. It's not entirely out of the question to believe that the second or third team could defeat the first eleven, were they matched in actual combat.

These men of the 1929 Honor Roll have been chosen with the aid of a confidential report from football coaches and writers in various sections of the country. Twenty-five schools in 16 states produced the athletes selected.

We have sought versatile football players for the All-America teams, believing that versatility lies a team's strength. A combination of shifty runners, strong line plungers, kickers, passers and pass-receivers is the desired arrangement. In all these teams they are combined to the 11th degree.
