Tuberculosis Society Has Received \$986.80, Official Says

With \$986.80 already received from the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills district, the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals is progressing rapidly. There were 2,500 letters sent out, and 1,200 have so far come back, leaving \$3,300 to be heard from.

As a special project, the money will be used to help the American Legion in its efforts to provide undernourished children with milk. The clinic also maintains chest clinics held after the Birmingham health the second Tuesday of every month at the Community House.

Birmingham members of the Board of Directors include Mrs. L. Virginia Hewitt, president, of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Association, and a member of the executive committee; Mr. Charles J. Shain, on the finance committee, and Seymour Adams, on the project committee.
