Engels' Cagers Come From Behind In Third Quarter

FORMER STARS PLAY

After lagging through the first two periods and part of the third, Coach Engels' Baldwin High school five struck up a fast offense and vanquished the Alumni by a 25-22 score Thursday night in the Baldwin gymnasium. By taking the game the Maroons evened the number of wins and losses so far this season. They have downed Dearborn and have lost to Detroit Central and Pontiac.

Wedge proved valuable for the Maroons. He was quick offensively and was a fast worker on defense. Berger, pivot man for the Maroons, was slow at seeing openings during the most of the first half but came through well in the second half.
