FURS PERMITS NOT NEEDED
Lansing, Dec. 22.—Trappers are not required to have a special permit to ship furs out of the state, according to the law enforcement division of the Department of Conservation. Annual Christmas dinner, for children of Rochester, was held Friday night in the Community House, under auspices of the Welfare Committee, with about 60 eager, happy youngsters in attendance.

Those in charge of the affair saw to it that none missed all he or she could care for in the way of food, and gifts were presented each little guest, after the dinner. Music was provided by the high school glee club and the men's chorus.

Organizations assisting in the affair included the Young Men's club, Exchange club and Boy Scouts. The latter furnished 150 toys.

Roger Schiedel of Detroit, stood mute Friday to a charge of having liquor in his possession and will have an examination Dec. 27 before Justice John E. Brondige, Royal Oak Township. He was arrested after a taxicab driver noticed Schiedel take a bottle of alleged liquor from one of several parcels, all of which are said to have contained bottles of the alleged contraband. Schiedel received medical attention Friday night when he suffered a stroke in his cell at the police station. The attending doctor said the stroke was an after-effect of being intoxicated.
