

WATERSETS FIRE IN BARN BY ACCIDENT

Family Living in Apartment of Structure Escape Unhurt

BLOW-TORCH IS CAUSE

Fire caused by an attempt to thaw frozen water pipes with a blow-torch, last night gutted a large frame barn of Horace Cooley, 611 Elm street.

The fire, Cooley reported, was started when he and Mrs. Stapleton attempted to thaw out frozen water pipes in the barn with a blow-torch at 5:40 p. m.

Although he could give no estimate of the damage, Mr. Cooley said that all of his grain and feed in the barn, which was stored with eight tons of hay, had been destroyed.

Mr. Cooley said his property was insured against fire.

The motive for the shooting still is a matter of some mystery, for Gorman confessed that he had shot Townsend in self defense during an argument.

Gorman was shot twice in the head, both bullets having been fired from a .35 caliber automatic pistol.
