

# CLASS WALLS AT EXHIBIT

**STOCKHOLM**—Large numbers of comparatively small halls with walls made almost entirely of glass is to be one of the striking features of the Stockholm Exposition, preparations for the opening of which on May 15 next are already being pushed ahead. The effect of this plan is that in the evening, when the halls are closed, the articles exhibited may be seen from the outside through the glass walls as the halls will be brilliantly lighted from within, showing up their entire contents. These groups of small halls are separated by flowered gardens with benches, where the visitor may sit.

In a tour through the grounds with the general director, Dr. Gregor Paulsen, and the head architect, E. G. Asplund, representative of the Christian Science Monitor found the buildings already roofed in, so that in the spring there will remain only the placing of the objects on exhibit in their halls.

The exposition is unique because it lies practically in the center of Stockholm, often called "The City of Islands." One of the most beautiful parks of the city, Diplomat Park, containing many fashionable residences, has been chosen as the site. This park surrounds a body of water called Djurgården Bay, and for exposition purposes the two banks of the river are connected by a new bridge.

Sailing boats such as one finds in Hamburg on the Alster will be on the banks of water and aquatic sports, rowing, sailing and swimming races will take place here, ending up with a display of fireworks every evening. A large illuminated fountain will be installed by the French firm, L. Or. This fountain rises 25 meters above the water, and when it flows it will force 18,000 liters of water a minute.

A big open space, holding 50,000 people, in the center of the exposition, on the banks of the stream, will be devoted to orchestral performances and even to festival dances, performed by Swedish artistic and dramatic talent. Dominating this open space will be a tower 80 meters high, with an elevator to the top from which the environs of Stockholm may be viewed. Here will be a radio station as a room for the press.

A notable feature of the exposition is a garden with 10,000 species already planted, and equipped with electric pipes under the ground, which will force the growth so that they will be ready three weeks earlier than is usual in Sweden.

Behind the exposition grounds a large agricultural exposition in model farms and other shows of interest to farmers. The aim of the exposition is to show Swedish home culture in all its artistic details, including small model homes worked out according to different incomes, proving that even the simple workman may live in artistic and healthy surroundings. The height of Swedish art industry will also be displayed, such as its famous Orrefors glass.

# GRAND TRUNK BUILDING WORK PROGRESSES RAPIDLY

With the work on five Grand Trunk underpasses well under way and the start of two more scheduled within two weeks, construction on the right-of-way between Detroit and Pontiac is being rushed today. A crew of more than 500 men is at work along the right-of-way. Grand Trunk officials declare:

A total of 18 underpass bridges will be completed by the officials plan. All bridges are of re-enforced concrete and are of the underpass design. Work on three highway bridges over the tracks is slated for spring.

Completion of the underpasses at Fourteen Mile road and Webster avenue, Royal Oak is scheduled within two weeks. Activities now are being rushed on the underpasses at Bloomfield Center, Charing Cross road, and Thirteen Mile road. Construction of similar bridges at Farnum and Greenleaf roads, Royal Oak, will start immediately, officials announce.

**Lay Tracks in 1930**  
Although no definite date is named for track laying, it will probably be started in January, those in charge declare. It is planned that one or two tracks will be laid by spring.

The outstanding feature of the new Grand Trunk line will be the elimination of grade crossings, according to officials. By the installation of the new right-of-way five crossings in the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hill district will be eliminated. Under passes are being substituted with the exception of the Beaver road, which bridges to be constructed in the spring.

Crews of men from the Nelson Construction company are at work on the roadbed between the Fourteen Mile road and Square Lake road. Work on the embankment between Fourteen Mile and Maple roads already is completed. Activities now center in the cut between Maple and Royal Oak roads, between Charing Cross and the Beaver roads, and the section north of Square Lake road.

**Material At Hand**  
The territory in the Square Lake road section is supplying the material for the filling in of the cuts in the other areas. It is estimated that over a million cubic yards of gravel will be removed here and transported and dumped along the dinkey tracks to areas along the right-of-way.

Dates of the closing of Maple and Adams roads still remain indefinite, according to officials. It is expected that Adams road will be closed to traffic within a month, however. In both instances traffic cannot be cut off, but will be detoured, officials declare.

Work along the right-of-way also included the encasing of sewers in concrete in the Royal Oak section as well as the laying of additional sewers. A number of houses in Royal Oak also have been moved to clear property for the right-of-way. No houses in the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills district will be moved, however.
