Although there are no cases of diphtheria in Birmingham at the present writing, the fact that the case rate and death rate in Oakland County last year was 50 per cent higher than that of the State at large, and that the rate in the State of Michigan was 50 per cent higher than the rate throughout the rest of the United States, it is imperative that we bend every effort to make Birmingham 100 per cent immune, when there is so much of it around us.

Diphtheria could be positively stamped out if all children, when they attain the age of 6 months, were given toxin-antitoxin.
