ORR SPEAKS  
BEFORE GROUPProsecutor Talks On Crime  
Conditions Before Oak-  
land Council

Norman Orr, prosecuting attorney of Oakland County, in his talk before the Oakland County Council of Women Tuesday at the Community House declared education to be a possible solution of the crime problem.

"In the United States," he said, "about \$400,000,000 a year is spent in the tracing and punishing of crime and this amount is steadily increasing. I would like to see at least a half of this expended for educational purposes."

Mr. Orr traced the lives of criminals pointing out that the first criminal tendencies were nurtured by improper home environment. "It is very often the economic condition in the home that is in lack of the criminal urge," he said.

He believes that much of this could be avoided by proper education. "Every child should have a high school education," he said, "but there are some communities which are without high schools. In such districts the children are forced to pay tuition and often they can not afford it so they go to work." He told of the sort of work open to young persons handicapped by lack of a high school training. "They become dissatisfied with their lot when they find themselves contending with educated persons. Then they invariably drift from bad to worse."

Mr. Orr said it is the duty of the state to provide a fund for communities unable to afford high schools. I hope to see more money spent on education and less on crime, he said.

In closing, he invited the members of the Council to attend court sessions in Pontiac.
