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HUDSON DISCUSSES BOX BILL AFFECTING ENTRANCE OF ALIENS

Last Friday the House passed and sent to the Senate the Box Bill to make more stringent the regulations governing the entry into the United States of aliens seeking work. The House further amended the Senate deportation bill to provide for the deportation of aliens convicted of carrying weapons or bombs.

The first measure has a direct interest to the Michigan Sixth District inasmuch as it will attempt to shut off the flow of employment in competition with American workmen. It will allow, however, the continued employment of bona fide Canadian citizens who have established their residence in Canada and who have secured the necessary passports from that country. Directly, the measure will shut out aliens who are attempting to beat the United States immigration quota regulations and

who maintain temporary residence in Canada and then cross the boundary daily to work in the United States. This bill affects the Detroit and Buffalo centers principally.

His Aliens

Regarding the recent measure, it is pointed out that no class of people suffers more from the actions of undesirable and law-breaking aliens than does that great body of aliens, worthy and deserving aliens residing in our country, in good faith are contributing to the welfare of the country and are in large numbers attempting to become citizens of the United States. The principal reason for deporting undesirable aliens is to promote the maintenance of law and order in this country and to afford protection and opportunities for the development to all the people residing in our country, aliens and citizens alike. Unworthy conduct and flagrant disregard of the laws of our country on the part of a very small percentage of the aliens residing in the United States unfortunately, but certainly, tend to create a prejudice in the public mind against all aliens. Therefore the deportation of that small percentage of undesirable aliens will redound to the benefit of the worthy and deserving aliens in the country to an equal, if not greater, degree than that of our own citizens.

Included in the original bill are provisions making deportation possible because of alien-smuggling, opium and other drug smuggling, besides other serious law violations, commonly punishable to citizens and aliens alike in this country. It is my contention, however, that deportation should be enforced in case of violations against the prohibition laws. Prohibition enforcement agents report aliens in large numbers are engaged in bootlegging, not only across the borders but also in this country.

Source of letters from the Sixth District have been coming to me during the past two weeks favoring adoption of the Norbeck-Andersen Game Refuge Bill, which I am pleased to state was unanimously passed by the House on Feb. 9. This bill created an \$8,000,000 system of 125 bird, fish and game animal refuges throughout the land. Under the provisions of the bill, appropriations for the purchase of land in every state in the Union will be made available as follows: \$75,000 for 1929; \$200,000 for 1931; \$600,000 for 1932; \$1,000,000 per year thereafter for seven years, after which time the appropriation will continue at the rate of \$200,000 per year for administration of the game refuges.

Provide For Birds

Three-fold will be the purpose of the act. It will provide sanctuaries for migratory birds; it will provide un molested spawning and feeding streams for fish and it will furnish places for the propagation of such fur-bearing animals as beaver, mink, muskrat, fox, etc. All wild life within the sanctuaries will be protected inviolate from hunters and fishermen, so that the encroachments of civilization as the years go by will not deprive posterity of the native wild life now threatened with extinction.

Creating sanctuaries for birds, fish and animals, while worthwhile and a step in the right direction, is not as important as creating a proper retirement fund for Civil Service employees, in fact a refuge for human kind. The Federal Employee's Retirement Bill, now being opposed in the House, would raise the average retirement pay from \$700 to \$800, advance the retirement age by two years, and raise the maximum retirement pay to \$12,000. Bloomfield Hills, one of the most exclusive residential districts in the country, has been desirous of obtaining a post office that will conform in beauty and design with the other buildings of the village. Residents of the village have offered to bear a considerable share of the expense of this building which I believe will be allowed by the United States Post Office Department.

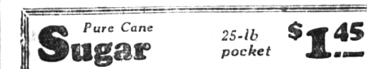
