

QUARANTINE IS EFFECTED FOR ALL DOGS

Police To Insist On Enforcing State-Wide Ban As Safety Measure

RESTRICTIONS ORDERED

A 90-day quarantine on dogs is in effect today in Birmingham and throughout Oakland County, following its issuance last Friday by B. J. Killham, state veterinarian. The quarantine was brought about by the present rabies epidemic, Killham pointed out. The quarantine, which went into effect Friday and continues through to May 15, will be rigidly enforced in the village, Police Chief James Anderson announced. During this time dogs which have been vaccinated will not be

allowed to run at large as in previous quarantines, Chief Anderson said. All dogs must be leashed, muzzled or confined to the premises of their owners, he said. "The village police department will capture all stray dogs and keep them for 48 hours. If at the close of that time they are not claimed they will be killed," Chief Anderson said. In the event that the dogs can not be captured, they will be shot on the street, he said. Oakland County dogs have been in quarantine for more than a week and the order follows a request of Sheriff Frank Schram. A maximum penalty of \$500 or six months' imprisonment may be imposed on persons violating the order, according to state law.

Graham drove the boy to his home, made a statement to the police and was released.

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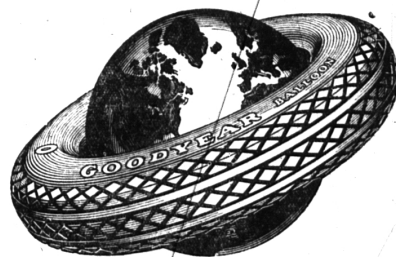
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
