The worst adventures tale was that of the kidnapping of Alime McPherson.

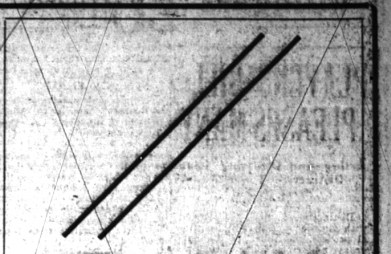

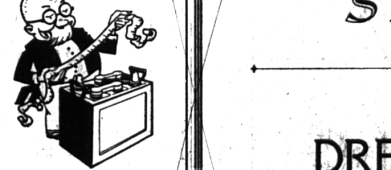
