

DRIVER FACES RUM CHARGE

Nabbed in Bloomfield Hills,
Man Demands Hearing

Cesar Stickney, 31 years old, of 284 west Wilson avenue, Pontiac, will appear today at 1 p. m. before Justice Floyd Buck for examination.

Stickney who was arrested last Wednesday in Bloomfield Hills on a charge of transporting liquor pleaded guilty. He originally waived examination and was bound over to circuit court but since demanded examination.

He has been held this week at the Oakland County jail in default of \$1,500 bail.

Patrolman L. A. Martin, who arrested Stickney, said that he found 10 gallons of moonshine in his car. Stickney was driving north on Woodward avenue on the wrong side of the road, Martin said.

ECCENTRIC IN SECOND PLACE

Ranks Near Advertising
Leader In 10,000
Weeklies

The Birmingham Eccentric ranks second in advertising income for 1928 out of the 10,000 weekly newspapers in the United States, according to a survey made by the American Press. The total volume was 112,228 inches. Of this 30,406 inches were local display and 14,589 national display.

Ranking first is the Washington Star, of Washington, New Jersey, with a total line of 130,268 inches, leading The Eccentric by 18,730 inches.

The Eccentric held sixth place among the weeklies for 1927, the New Jersey paper also heading the list for that year.

The American Press Magazine for February which carried the list of the leading weeklies with their advertising volumes says:

"The Birmingham Eccentric, which ranks second among the weeklies from which figures have been received, in point of total volume, made perhaps the greatest gain in business of any weekly in the country, and The Eccentric expects to keep right on improving during 1929. Their gain during 1928 was 33,318 inches. 'The papers of the country as a whole show a gain during 1928, and in advertising income, both local and national display had a greater volume than ever before. Fifty-two weeklies reported a volume of advertising for the year in excess of 50,000 inches, and but 29 papers reached this amount in 1927.'"
