Detroit Pastor To Give Commencement Address Jan. 25

PUBLIC IS TO ATTEND

Twenty-five students of Baldwin High School are expected to graduate in the first mid-year commencement exercises at the high school. The program for the commencement in the school auditorium, Friday, Jan. 25, at 8 p. m., it is announced.

Rev. Alvin E. Magary, pastor of the Woodward Avenue Presbyterian Church of Detroit, will give the commencement address. Baccalaureate services and class night will not be held for the January class in view of the small number who are participating. Principal Melvin C. Hart said.

A banquet for the senior class will be held Jan. 24 the night preceding commencement. The class prophecy and other class night functions are scheduled for this time.

The concentrated defense of the two quintets on the large floor kept the try at the basket few and made a margin of a point or two worth while. Capt. Doherty and Ladd, guarding the Mustangs, were notable factors in preventing the Mt. Clemens hoopers from accounting more easily.

HART PREPARES WORK OF TERM

The schedule of classes for next semester is being prepared today at Baldwin High School by Melvin C. Hart, principal.

Election of subjects desired has been made by the students and their schedules are now being arranged.

The total enrollment for the second semester will be approximately 655, Mr. Hart avers. Of the number 34 Seven B pupils enter the high school from various grade schools and 12 Ten B's come to Baldwin from the Adams school while 25 seniors are lost by graduation.

The new semester begins Jan. 28 following the week of final examinations which occur on Jan. 22 and 23.

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
