LIONS PROJECTS
OUTLINED BY
CLUB OFFICIAL

The three major projects of the Lion clubs of the state were outlined by Dr. Philip A. Callahan, district governor of lower Michigan clubs to the Birmingham members at its luncheon meeting yesterday, at the Chateau Tea room. "Relief of the blind is one of the principal aims of the organization," Dr. Callahan pointed out. He told of the value of the work being done in aiding school children with defective vision. The work, sponsored already done in various communities by the Lions, includes medical care, provision of glasses and operations to restore vision. Bay City and Pontiac Lions he said, have accomplished much in this field.

The second portion of the program is educational in a nationwide attempt to curb the distribution of narcotics, Dr. Callahan said. He urged co-operation in warring against the international dope ring which stimulates the use of dope to increase its enormous profits. "International traffic with England to limit the production of narcotics and allow only enough for medical uses is the only solution to the problem which includes 18,000 addicts in Wayne county and 1,000,000 in the United States," Dr. Callahan averred, but pointed out that much could be done in a campaign for the "salvaging of human wreckage." The completion of the Great Lake-St. Lawrence waterway for ocean commerce was the third project which the state Lion clubs could promote, Dr. Callahan concluded. He stressed the ultimate prosperity which would result from ocean ship trade brought to Michigan ports.
