EMPLOYMENT BUREAU GETS APPLICANTS FROM EUROPE

The Employment Bureau at the Community House doesn't serve only Birmingham and vicinity. Tuesday afternoon two young women from Scotland, who had just arrived in America for only five weeks, visited there in search of situations. They are Ina McKennie, 25 years old, and Morrison McKennie, 20 years old. They left their parents and two sisters at Ardamale W. Lothian, Scotland, five weeks ago to face a new life, find new homes and ambitions. They had friends in Detroit, had heard of it being the land of prosperity, and they selected that city for their home. Morrison had already obtained housework and her sister, Ina, received information at the Employment Bureau that assisted her in becoming located also. "We've been seaship, train sick and home sick," Ina said, and her sister added, "If we could take a charge of her home town in Scotland, and told of many interesting differences in the two. They expect to be joined by their parents and sisters in March, and he explained that that was their only hope in the hectic days they have been living in getting adjusted to a new life. "Oh, but we were afraid coming over," Ina stated with all the Scotch accent, and told of the ship, the Transylvania, upon which they were passengers, receiving an S. O. S. call from a German schooner. They went back a distance of about 150 miles, but were unable to help the schooner in distress and lay in midocean two days while the German vessel sank.
