Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Matheson, of Vaughn road, are home from a sojourn in New York City.

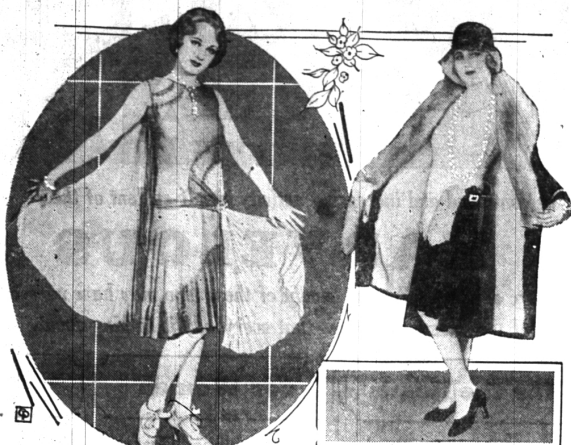

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MENU HINT

Scotch Broth
Roast Pork Apple Rings

Today's Recipes

Scotch Broth—Boil four pounds of lean mutton in four quarts of water. Stir into it half a pound of barley. Keep it well mixed until the water boils and skim the surface carefully until the broth is simmering. Skim it just as fast as the scum arises. Cut up a couple of carrots, a turnip, and an onion; add these with a quart of green peas, a few sprigs of parsley and pepper and salt to taste. The vegetables should not be allowed to boil a longer time than is required to cook them.

Lady Fingers with Whipped Cream

Arrange lady fingers in circles in deep sherbert cups, fill circles with cream which is well stiff and slightly sweetened. Garnish with a cherry or nut.

Suggestions Macaroni Cups

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and wash with cold water. Butter melids and line with the cooked macaroni. Fill the cups with a mixture of well-seasoned white sauce and bread crumbs or cooked tomatoes and buttered bread crumbs. Cover cup with macaroni. Bake in moderate oven until slightly browned. Serve with tomato or cheese sauce.

Sardine Capers

These delicious little toasted sandwiches are to be served instead of a fruit or fish cocktail, before a dinner. Mash six or eight sardines with the yolk of a hard-boiled egg. Add salt and pepper to taste, and mix with a mixture of Garnish around the edges with finely chopped parsley, and the white of an egg rubbed through a sieve.

STYLE WHIMISIES

Paris mème is a new soft straw, which is being used to make some of the smartest and most becoming hats of the new spring season.

Lace gowns of all colors and types are being shown, chenille lace in strong blue shades being particularly favored.

A black velvet gown bought by Miss Hattie Stiles, the singer, has long side panels terminating in tulle bands. It has a jeweled shoulder ornament which is also a strap, which comprises a crystal ring, brilliant and emerald green stones. Only one shoulder is strapped in jewels, the other strap being cut in one with the bodice.

STUFFED DATES

(Mrs. Mary Morton's Weekly Tested Recipe)

Wipe the dates carefully, and cut off one end of each with a sharp knife, making the cut about half an inch deep. Pull out the pit lengthwise. Soften about a half-pound of almond paste with a little water, and beat in a half-pound of confectioner's sugar. Divide the paste into four parts—flavor the first part with a little lemon rind, grated; the second with grated orange rind; the third with a few chopped cherries, the fourth with finely-chopped pistachio nuts. Roll and cut each filling about three-quarter inch long and about one-half inch thick. Stuff each date lengthwise with the chosen mixture, and roll the dates in granulated sugar.
