

TROY HOME IS BURGLARIZED OF FURNITURE

Thieves Loot Home of Valuables in Absence of Owner

FAIL TO FIND CLUES

Investigation is being made today of the burglary of the house owned by Mrs. G. M. Clarke, on the Rochester road north of the Eighteen Mile road.

The robbery was reported to Deputy Sheriff George Forsythe, Thursday, by E. J. Rodgers, 19603 Covington avenue, Detroit, who is taking care of the house for Mrs. Clarke who is in the hospital.

He said that someone had entered the back door with a key and ransacked the house of furnishings. Included among the articles missed were an electric sewing machine, a vacuum cleaner, an ironing board, a bridge lamp, linen, silverware and dishes. Other articles were believed to have been taken, according to Rodgers who had not made a complete check.

Deputy George Hoyt, county finger print expert examined the house with Deputy Forsythe, but found no clues. They believe the marauders were gloves.

LIGHTS ASKED ON HIGHWAYS IN TOWNSHIP

Troy Negotiates For Illumination On Seven More Miles Of Road

PLANS ARE DISCUSSED

Plans are being made today by the Detroit Edison company to provide street lights on seven miles of Troy Township highway. A layout was asked of the Edison company by the board of supervisors following their special meeting, Saturday. The lights will conform, it is expected, to a type of light already used on many of the township roads.

Included in the thoroughfares to be lighted are two miles on the Clawson road between Brooks road and the section line between Troy and Royal Oak, four miles on John R. avenue between the Big Beaver road and the northern township boundary line and one mile on maple avenue between John R. and DeQuindre roads.

TROY POLICE MAKE REPORT

Annual Review Of Year's Activities Made By Officers

Ninety-seven arrests were made during 1928 in Troy Township it is reported today from the office of Deputy George Forsythe and Elmer Ford.

Of the total number arrested, 42 were arraigned before William S. Walker, Troy Township justice. Fines totaling \$396.35 were paid by offenders, while two persons were sentenced over to circuit court, five received jail sentences totaling 250 days and two had sentences suspended.

Eleven reckless drivers headed the list of the misdemeanors with the fines amounting to \$165. Following this were nine charged with simple larceny and five disorders with penalties totaling \$280. Four arraignments for assault and battery and four charged with non-support were next.
